## The SC WW2 project

One thing leads to another. During the group's February visit to the Geraldine Military Museum Lois White commented that if our generation didn't name their parents' war photos our children would probably not be able to do so. And we've all got them. Most of us had fathers or uncles or even grandfathers who served between 1939-45 in whatever capacity, and we've grown up with the photos from that time. We don't even really think of them as particularly historical, but Lois is right. For many of those photos it's now or never. Are yours catalogued? Are they named? Are they in danger of being summarily discarded by the next generation? We might not see the centenary of WW2 but all the more reason to make a start. So Lois is organising a project to collect, save and name our WW2 photos, and even those we can't put names to can be collected and shared in the hope that someone else might know who they are. They will be put together on our website and made safe for future generations in the best traditions of genealogists. So we hope you will all contribute. ## Home defence in South Canterbury, WW2

A unique series of bound volumes of copied newspaper clippings related to home defence in South Canterbury during World War Two.

Twenty seven volumes currently cover August 1940 through to August 1945. Includes the following subjects:

- Home Guard
- EPS (Emergency Precautions Service)
- Timaru Fire Emergency Service
- New Zealand Women's War Service Auxiliary
- The Semple Tank
- New Zealand Women's Land Army
- Black out trials
- Food rationing
- Defence building programme
- Air raid shelters

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Also includes two volumes of indices, providing an alphabetical index to Home Guard personnel and a general subject index (a copy of each can also be found in the Research Room).

## **Timaru Coast Defence Battery**

The Timaru Coast Defence site at Smithfield freezing works was built in 1942 during World War Two. The site was intended to provide a measure of security for the port and people of Timaru at a time when a Japanese invasion of New Zealand was genuinely feared. The battery had two guns, each of which was set in a large concrete emplacement with a small magazine and overhead cover. The fire of



the guns was directed by fire-control equipment housed in a Battery Observation Post (BOP) built, also in concrete, in front of and below the guns. A battery camp was built about 300 metres behind the guns. The site was used as an active defence site for only two years. At the end of the war, an agreement was struck with the then owner, the NZ Refrigerating Co to retain the concrete structures, for which the company was compensated. Coast artillery was removed from active New Zealand defences in 1959, since which time the emplacements have sat idle. One, the northernmost, was converted into a water tower in the late 1970s or 1980s.

The installation is a good surviving representative example of the smaller type of coastal defence installation that was commonly built around out coastline during WW2.

#### February

Meeting on 13 February, 6.30pm at Geraldine Military Museum. **Present:** 11 members and 3 visitors. **Apologies:** Carolyn Johnston, Esme Jones, Ann Munro, Barbara Ford, Adrienne Bruce, Hilary Coles, Christine Stewart.

The meeting was a visit to the Military Museum, Talbot Street, Geraldine. We were hosted by Don Pelvin. He welcomed everyone and gave a short history on how the museum came about. Initially the area was purely for storage of his exhibits. There are Vietnam and German displayed memorabilia. The mannequins, dressed in various uniforms from wars past, are actual people.

There has been an average of 50 visitors per day. The biggest day was 120 people. Don is surprised at how popular it has become.

He has some very rare vehicles. There are donated items that are on loan, and the rest he has acquired over the years. The museum is spectacular, well laid out, with very realistic setups. Well worth a visit.

#### March

Meeting on 12 March at Timaru Museum. **Present:** 18 members. **Apologies:** Carolyn Johnston, Lois White, Heather Fifield, Pat Smolenski, Esme Jones.

Lesley Tennent gave a presentation on Teams Farm, a well known property in Otaio. Started with Andrew Martin Snr, born in Scotland 1834, then to Victoria, Australia in 1854 with his brothers George, John H, and David. He was mining, and a wagonner. Was married in 1859, to Isabella nee Thomson (born 1838 in Scotland), who had come to Australia in 1857 as an assisted immigrant. Here about 7 years before coming to Otago, where he worked as a wagonner to the goldfields. Came to Otaio in 1865. He and brother George took up 100 acres cut from Jeannie Collier's Otaio run. While the house was being built they lived in tents. Large eucalyptus marks the place on the farm.

Andrew Snr and George continued their partnership, increasing the property size to 1500 acres. House, large and wooden, increased in size also as the family grew. While at Otaio a further seven sons and one daughter were born into the family. The farm partnership was dissolved in 1881. George was returning to England, on the Taurarua when it was shipwrecked at Otara Reef, Southland. He drowned and is buried in the Old Waimate Cemetery. Teams Farm was named because of the horse teams that were there. They made the farm the success it was in those early times. Andrew Snr was known to be a first class judge of Clydesdale horses. The farm was also a stopping point for Cobb & Co coaches.

It was a model farm in Andrew Snr's time. Had a grain shed, granary, staff accommodation block (included cook area), smithy, stables, woolshed, plus two large sheds, a well with windmill. Andrew Snr died 1908 at home and is buried Otaio cemetery.

Percy was the last of the Martins. He died 1973 while out on the farm. Buried at Otaio Cemetery. Farm auctioned in 1973 and Tennent family the lucky bidders. Farm needed a lot of work as ist was very run down. Hard to do much as was in the days of 24% interest rates. Lesley & husband Robert Tennent resided here until about 1981 then the house and 5 acres was rented out. A horse stud at one stage, but sold in 1985. After that it changed hands several times. October 2023 saw the original Teams Farm homestead demolished, and in November 2023 the new home arrived. The Tennent family still farm the rest of Teams Farm, also known to them as Martins.

I just read that Iain Davidson, a farmer from Riverton, who managed the FB site Unknown Warriors of the NZEF passed away suddenly in November 2023 at the age of 56. He helped many identify unnamed soldiers' photos and loved solving a good mystery. For South Canterbury connections he would send me the images of the RPPCs (real photo postcards). Some do have names on them for a start. The others need a lot of research. Knowledge of badges helps and that narrows it down.

lain was an expert on badges. He had a number of South Canterbury soldiers (identified and unidentified) in his photo collection. Iain had an interest in 1st NZEF badges for over 35 years. He had some success but matching them up with period newspaper photos has been his best bet. Iain had been actively collecting NZEF portrait images for the last five or so years but has been quite successful in that time having acquired about 600 photos sourcing them locally by advertising or browsing in shops, live auctions or buying whole collections off collectors downsizing,

Trade-me and eBay and contacts are other ways he obtained RPPCs.

Hints: Match up with rugby photos many of those faces are very recognizable!

Take a close look at the floor. A rough dirt floor or cobbled floor with a painted backdrop is a sure sign of a French mobile photography studio. These studios were set up miles behind the front lines, but close enough for soldiers off duty to get their photo taken.





Possibly there were some props at studios, however the walking belts would have been owned by the soldiers as a rule, and some would have swagger sticks, to impress the ladies. The photo of Hal and Will Sides was sent to lain by a friend in the UK who picked it up in a militaria fair. Iain only identified this one by matching it to an exact image on the South Canterbury Museum -SCRoll site (images). https://museum.timaru.govt.nz/explore/scroll

Henry James SIDES (Hal) was a son of Henry Alley and Mary (nee PREECE) SIDES. His brothers George William SIDES and Frank Roy SIDES also served in WWI. Identities confirmed by two family members. The photo was taken at Grantham camp in Lincolnshire, England by the Walter Lee Studio, the main Machine Gun training ground. Both the Sides brothers are wearing NZ Machine Gun Corps badges. It must have been of some comfort to the two men, and their mother, that they were both in the same camp and in England.

Walter Lee (1891 – 1969) photographer for 50 years, born in Grantham, England in 1891. Walter served his apprenticeship under the guidance of Alfred M Emery, whose premises were on London Road. In 1917 he opened his own studio in Watergate.
